




I am very pleased to have an opportunity to join this event and make a short report on my participation in the NASHIM program.




My trip to Japan was from 20.july.to 28.august.2010.

I visited Nagasaki Medical Association, Red Cross Nagasaki Atomic Bomb Hospital, Nursing Home of Hibakusha, Nagasaki Health Management Center, Radiation Effects Research Foundation, where I learned from our Japanese colleagues on radiation protection, diagnosis, treatment, prevention of diseases in people affected by ionizing radiation.




I also got to know Japan's health care system.





Very exciting was the possibility to speak with hibakusha of the atomic bombing of Nagasaki.



In Nagasaki University we were given the possibility to listen to a course of lectures on: history and culture of Japan, the consequences of atomic bombing, the effects of radiation on the human body as a whole and on various organs and systems, radiation protection in Japan and the world, statistical processing of medical data and more.



The practical part took place in various divisions of Nagasaki University Hospital.


